

# 23 Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

These lines are from Psalm 103. In other songs recently, we have seen the little words *sa* and *go* used to add emphasis, and here they are again, in lines 3 and 5. Another emphatic word we see here in line 7 is *Geget*, which can mean "indeed," or "really" or even "yes".

In lines 5-6, we remind God that He is righteous or just but also that He is merciful. Then, in lines 6-7, emphasis is put on God's mercy by the addition of **geget gibekaadendaagoz** ("you are truly patient"). The Church has perhaps chosen this psalm for today because it offers God's mercy and patience as a model for Jesus' teaching in today's Gospel reading that we should give love, mercy and kindness, particularly towards those who have hurt us.

*Zhawenjige* means "he or she is kind or merciful." The *gi*- prefix, means "you," so in line 6 *gizhawenjige* means "you are merciful." "*Gwakak* means "straight," "correct," or "right," and the verb related to this is *Gwayakwaadizi*, which means "he or she is righteous." When the prefix for "I" or "you" is added, the *-i* at the end of the word is dropped, as in line 5 *Gigwayakwaadiz* ("you are righteous"). We see another example of this same pattern in line 7 *gibekaadendaagoz* ("you are patient"), which is a "you form" of the verb *bekaadendaagozi* ("he or she is patient"). The same thing happens with verbs that end in *-o*, like *nagamo* ("he or she is singing"), but *ginagam* ("you are singing'). This

dropping of the final vowel does not happen with a final *-e*, as we see in this song in line 6 *gizhawenjige* ("you are merciful"), and it also doesn't happen when a verb ends in a double vowel, which indicates that the vowel is long. For example, *gopii* means "he or she is going inland from the water," and *ingopii means* "I am going inland." Similarly, *maajaa* = "he or she is leaving" but *gimaajaa* = "you are leaving".
