

Water, we love you

We thank you

We respect you

In today's gospel reading, Jesus says to the Samaritan woman: "If you knew the gift of God and who is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked him and he would have given you living water" (John 4:10). In another place in John's gospel, Jesus says "Let anyone who is thirsty come to me! Let anyone who believes in me come and drink!" and the gospel writer goes on to say: "As scripture says, 'From his heart shall flow streams of living water.' He was speaking of the Spirit which those who believed in him were to receive" (John 7:37-39). There are many passages in the Old Testament where water symbolizes life and God's goodness and saving action, and in John's gospel these ideas are applied to Christ's saving work for us.

For the Ojibwe, especially for the women who have been involved in the "water walk" and ceremonies associated with it, water is life. The song printed above is used in those ceremonies, and Maryanna, who has taken part of the water walk for several years, asked Doreen Day for permission for us to use this song in our liturgy today. She said, "Please do," and the Mother Earth Water Walk site mentions that "Doreen and her grandson, Mashkoonce, give permission for everyone to share this song... sing it to the water every day."

Each line of the song has a verb which we often use in hymns: in line 1 **zaagi'i** ("love someone"), in line 2 **miigwechiwenim** ("thank someone") and in line 3 **zhawenim**, which in many hymns means "bless someone" or "be merciful to someone," but in this song it means "respect someone." All three verbs have the suffix **-igoo** ("we") and the prefix **gi-** "you," and the "you" that we address in the song is **nibi** ("water").
